#### FROM THE RECTORY

#### Dear friends,

This year is the centennial anniversary of the Battle of the Somme which began on 1<sup>st</sup> July and ended on 18<sup>th</sup> November 1916, when fighting stopped because surviving the winter became the priority for both sides. It was one of the costliest battles of World War 1. The original Allied estimate of casualties on the Somme, stated at the time, was 485,000 British and French casualties and 630,000 German, but these figures are not entirely accurate. But on the first day alone the British Army lost nearly 60,000 men.

Debate still continues today on the value or futility of the Somme. Some argue that it was a necessary step in the change from old style Victorian warfare to a more modern style of "industrial warfare" with aeroplanes, tanks and guns. Some see it as a turning point in weakening and exhausting German resources leading to the final victory in 1918.

Another on-going debate is the place of religion in these conflicts. Anglican bishops and chaplains were with the troops, and people prayed in Sunday services and privately for their family members on the front line. But does this make the Great Was a "religious war" as one writer has stated?

The causes of the war seem not to have been religious at all, but more to do with land and power and the European desire to build empires. No doubt this empire building included an element of taking Victorian culture and church to annexed lands, but inside Europe the tensions between competing nations were not about religion. While there are pacifists in the Church, many acknowledge the need to defend against aggression and injustice. It is hard not to support the WW2 allies in their fight against Nazism.

In this country this year the Somme was remembered on 1<sup>st</sup> July at 7.28am with a two minute silence observed on all BBC Radio stations to mark the start of the battle. Across Britain 1,400 actors, dressed in replica World War 1-period British Army uniforms, walked about in streets and public open areas, each taking on the identity of a British soldier who died on the first day of the Somme, and handing out information cards about that soldier.

We will be remembering in our Remembrance Sunday Services in church all those who died in the two Great Wars and more recent conflicts, as well as praying for soldiers and victims in present day conflicts.

#### Things to be aiming to do on your plot:

- Broad beans sowing now means they don't suffer from black-fly
- Cabbage last chance to plant spring cabbage. Cover with net to protect from pigeons
- Garlic plant garlic cloves. The longer they are in the bigger next year's bulb will be
- Rhubarb now is the time to plant new sets or divide and prepare old crowns
- Fruit Bushes plant bare rooted bushes allowing them time to get their roots down before the start of next growing season.

Remember that the clocks go back at the end of the month, so grab every minute of daylight on the allotment that you can.



#### The Beckbury Show just keeps on growing....

On Saturday 24th September 2016, the Beckbury Show hit a record high, with an estimated 5,000 people coming through the gates. The show, now in its 8th year, goes from strength to strength and has grown from its humble beginning as a produce show to a firm favourite on the events calendar across the region.

The produce competitions and displays are still at the core of the show and it was a bumper year in the Produce Marquee, with the number of entries doubling year-on-year reflecting an overall total of 201 entries across all categories. The amount raised by the produce section also doubled year-on-year, through sales of the produce entries and the raffle for a box of produce which included vegetables, fruit and flowers all donated by the Beckbury Allotment Association. The entries covered every category and the judges had their work cut out to select winners given the high standard. The overall Produce Show winner was Ray Nightingale – a newcomer to the show.





The 5,000 visitors were treated to a full food court featuring locally sourced produce including a traditional BBQ and pig roast, a beer tent with cask ales and lagers, as well as a Pimm's tent, so ensuring plenty of refreshments for the whole family.

The Fun Fair complete with bouncy castle and merry-go-round kept the younger visitors happy, while the older generation rolled back the years to recall fond memories while looking around at the vintage tractors, cars and machinery.





At the heart of the show, as in previous years, was the main arena and stage and this year was exceptional for entertainment, with the pupils from Beckbury school and a Ukulele band taking to the stage and creating a real buzz around the show ground.



The main arena was just as exciting for all, with pony club races and games that included lots of audience participation. Particularly fascinating was a highly-skilled wood carver who used just a chainsaw to carve a bird out of a block of wood — which was afterwards auctioned and raised over £100. The birds of prey then took flight, giving a stunning display that had the crowds transfixed.

A 40-stall Farmers Market completed this unique blend of a Country Show and Fete that has proven to be, year after year, a fun day out for all the family.

The Beckbury show is organised and run by local volunteers with the sole aim of raising money for local charities – and without their willingness and hard work, the show wouldn't be possible. So a big thank you to everyone who made a contribution this year: it was welcomed and greatly appreciated.

Since its inception the Beckbury show has raised over £60,000 and, once confirmed, this year's figure will be added to that amazing total.

Now the planning starts for **2017** – and we hope to see you all there next year!
