## FROM THE RECTORY

**We wish you a merry Christmas.....**

Dear friends

I wonder if you have a favourite Christmas carol? There are so many to choose from. Christmas attracts attention from lots of musicians and song writers, including of course non-religious songs without reference to the Bethlehem nativity. And if it hasn't started already I expect we will hear in shops and the media plenty of Slade and Band Aid, though some of you may prefer '*have yourself a merry little Christmas*', '*let it snow, let it snow*' or even '*Rocking around the Christmas tree*' (there's a good start for your 2018 family Christmas quiz "who sang.....?")

In our carol services at church we won't be singing any of those hits from the recent past. While there is an element of community carol singing, there is also the element of worship and telling the Christmas story.

There are lots of occasions nowadays for this, including , TV, radio and on line with a variety of Christmas services and carols from different cathedrals and churches, and some people prefer "the church of the air" to singing with a crowd in a building.

St Francis (1223) is credited with reviving singing carols as part of telling the nativity story. But in England Cromwell and the Puritans stopped carol singing – indeed in 1644 they “abolished Christmas”, and even later the Church of England was suspicious of all hymns and carols, and only chanted biblical psalms and canticles.

Thankfully the Victorians revived the old custom and we today are grateful that musicians and composers of that time collected and recorded old Christmas songs from around the country (hence some titles like The Sussex carol; the Herefordshire carol).

“Christmas comes but once a year” – though as I wrote last month, the season starts much earlier than it used to. Our services at the churches can be found in the [Six Parishes Service rota](#); I hope you find one of them at a convenient time for you in this busy season.

It is a bring-and-share party where everyone brings a selection of party food, and of course **the puddings**. To round off the afternoon some of the children from Beckbury School will be joining us to sing carols and, hopefully, getting our members to join in with some of the songs.

## **BECKBURY VILLAGE HALL – an update**

At a public meeting in the Village Hall on 13<sup>th</sup> September we had the pleasure of launching the '**Beckbury Village Hall Refurbishment Fund**' as part of our AGM. About 25 local residents saw our vision for the future of the Village Hall and heard about how we intend to raise the funds to achieve that vision.

The refurbishment will be phased with Stage 1 commencing as soon as we have secured the funds. During Stage 1 we intend to totally refurbish the roof including installation of Velux windows, remove the unsightly internal pipe-work and rewire including installation of new lighting.

We intend to bring the hall to a standard such that it will be financially self-sustaining.

Funds to bring it to this state will come from four main sources:

- a. One off grant funding from trusts
- b. Annual subscriptions from individuals
- c. One off donations from individuals/organisations
- d. One off fundraising events

As part of (c) we launched our **FAD (Fund a Day) scheme**. The running costs of the hall once refurbished are estimated at £14 a day. We are therefore inviting individuals to sponsor a day for £14 – we have ‘sold’ several days already – mostly people are sponsoring their birthdays, but you can choose any. There will be an annual reward for one lucky person, chosen at random from those sponsoring the hall in such a way. Please get in touch if you would like to do this.

Several residents have for many years made regular subscriptions to the hall. We are very grateful for these but would invite more residents to consider this way of supporting us in this way.

Since the launch we held a highly successful ‘Dinner, Drinks and Dance’ evening which was enjoyed by over 60 people and raised a magnificent £1,060 profit, meaning that we can now remove the pipe-works!

If you could help us by organising a fundraiser or in any of the ways suggested above, please do get in touch.

The committee has been very busy with writing Business Plans, fundraising applications, Health and Safety policies, Safeguarding policies etc etc. If you feel you can support us in any way please do come along to our meetings – you don’t have to be on the committee, all are welcome, **Our next meeting is at 7.30pm on Thursday 17<sup>th</sup> January 2019.**

Jobs to be getting on with on the allotment in December:

With the festive season soon upon us we hardly have time to think about our frost covered plots. But if weather permits and you feel like working off a few mince pies, then here are a few jobs to be getting on with.

- Bonfire rubbish
- Order seeds
- Plan veg beds
- Winter prune fruit bushes (not stone fruit)
- Force rhubarb
- Wash down greenhouses and polytunnels with Citrox (a natural disinfectant made from citrus fruits)
- Also containers, seed trays and potting bench (prevents pests and disease at the propagation stage)
- Prune grapes. This job was traditionally carried out on New Year's Day
- Ensure that the wheelbarrow doesn't have a flat tyre!

So, although the allotment may look a little bare, there is plenty to be getting on with if you can drag yourself away from the warmth of your fire. If anyone is interested in taking on a plot there are a few available. Please contact Gina Somerville (allotment chairwoman) on 07795625316

## **BECKBURY TRAIL – SUNDAY 18<sup>TH</sup> November.**

On a bright, sunny winter morning 300 runners gathered in Higford Lane, Beckbury, waiting apprehensively for the klaxon signalling the 11am start of this 5.6 mile run. Standing at the top of Higford Lane what an impressive sight appeared before the eyes as they all headed my way, with local runners Alex Lister, Lucie Tait-Harris and Tom McAllister well to the fore.



All too soon we lost sight of the runners as they headed for Stableford and then up a steep hill into Ackleton, next following a track over fields down to Badger Dingle, then to Badger and down The Chase to head back to Beckbury via the Wanderers and finally coming back into view at the top of Higford Lane. By now the breathing was getting harder as the hills told on lungs and legs, but yet another hill to climb and then over the last two fields for the run in to the finish.

Local runners featured well in the placings with 11<sup>th</sup> place going to Alex Lister 40.06 mins, closely followed by Lucie Tait-Harris 42.21 and Tom McAllister 42.51. James Paice finished with 49.45 and Peter Gibbins with 50.51 and not far behind was Ed Solari with 54.21 mins.

All in all a very successful day for everyone with praise going to Richard Handley (Race Director) and his team for their work, including remembering to have back-runners to pick up any litter dropped en-route.


# **SHROPSHIRE'S 1<sup>ST</sup> ORGANIC MILK VENDING MACHINE**

## **At Chatham's Organic Dairy, Brockton Grange, Shifnal. TF11 9LZ**

The Chathams have been caring for cows on the award-winning family farm in the beautiful Shropshire countryside, near Shifnal, for three generations. They continue to strive to ensure that everything works in harmony on the farm today, passing on their love of sustainable farming. Their cows have the freedom to graze on pastures grown on healthy Shropshire soil, full of natural goodness, producing milk, **without** the use of antibiotics, artificial chemical herbicides and fertilisers or GM feeds, which they are proud to sell fresh from the farm.

You can now experience their newly designed dairy at the farm gate. Inside you can find **Shropshire's first organic milk vending machine**. You can purchase a **bespoke reusable glass bottle**, fill it straight from the vending machine, and help reduce your plastic footprint. The milk is gently pasteurised on-site to maximise the taste and non-homogenised so the cream rises to the top. You can also buy organic cheese and free-range eggs from a second vending machine. If you're lucky you may see the cows grazing in a field nearby.
