

Sunday services at Badger, Ryton, Kemberton and Stockton have been suspended under the Bishop's Dispensation in the current Covid situation.


PRAYER OF THE MONTH

FROM THE RECTORY

The rolling English Road

Dear friends,

During the lockdown restrictions of the past 12 months many people have taken the opportunity to take their exercise by walking. In our six parishes there are plenty of public and permissive footpaths to enjoy. Last spring was unbelievably sunny and dry, and some footpaths were very busy.

In these recent winter months with snow and rain some of the footpaths were challenging, to put it mildly. I was recently on a bridleway which was also a tractor route with deep mud ruts. At the track's lowest point it crossed a stream which formed an impassable lake with no way across or through it (but thankfully a detour around it via the fields).

I decided that the lanes were a safer route for walking and there are enough quiet lanes with little traffic in the area to make for pleasant walking. On foot as well as in the car we notice the unexpected bends and curves in our English country lanes instead of straight lines.

G K Chesterton explains in his poem "The Rolling English Road"

Before the Roman came to Rye or out to Severn strode, The rolling English drunkard made the rolling English road. A reeling road, a rolling road, that rambles round the shire, And after him the parson ran, the sexton and the squire; A merry road, a mazy road, and such as we did tread The night we went to Birmingham by way of Beachy Head.

Other more serious writers have made suggestions about the bends and tight turns e.g. ponds and woods now vanished; land ownership; farmers pushing out their field boundaries.

People sometimes quote Jesus telling us to stay on the 'straight and narrow'. In fact the first word is "strait" (linked to "strict") meaning tight and difficult to get through, as in Jesus' image of camels not getting through the eye of a needle. (Some of you may have heard of Wainwright's naming of a narrow section on Lingmoor in the Lake District as 'fat man's agony')

Life is rarely easy and straightforward. This present Church season of Lent invite us to reflect on the twists and turns which we have had to negotiate, and to consider making amendments and corrections where they have been of our own making. It's something to think about as we enjoy walking on the twists and turns of our lanes and footpaths.

HIGFORD LANE

Beckbury Parish Council held an emergency meeting on Wednesday 27th January 2021. This was in relation to a planning application for a large structure and outbuildings to be erected on the field at the top of Higford Lane, Beckbury by David Austin Roses.

The Council met to discuss the application and the impact that it would have on green belt land and the local area. It was agreed by all Councillors that the impact of the application would have a huge impact on the villages of Beckbury and Badger. The main structure itself was the size of two football pitches side by side or the size of Sainsbury's at Telford Retail Park. The entrance to the site would be a dirt road along Badger Lane, which would have resulted in an increase of vehicular traffic and potentially HGV's going in and out of the site. It was agreed that the local road network would not be able to sustain the increased traffic on the already pothole ridden roads.

The Parish Council submitted a series of objections against the proposal. The details were passed to Beckbury residents with a vast majority angry and upset at the planning proposals. This resulted in a petition being started and comments against the proposal being made against the proposal on the planning website.

In all 86 comments were made in objection to the proposal showing the thoughts of Beckbury residents and the local community. I am pleased to say that on the 12th February 2021 the application was <u>WITHDRAWN</u> by the applicants.

BECKBURY ALLOTMENTS ASSOCIATION

The good news is that British summertime is nearly upon us and we can put February's weather behind us. The clocks go forward on 28th March which means lighter nights and with a bit of luck some much needed sunshine and a chance to get started on our plots.

It's this time of the year when we gardeners come out of winter hibernation. I've been busy the last few weeks planning and writing lists, I always get excited about what the allotment holds for the year ahead and what new vegetables I'm going to grow. Tomatillo, Thai round green aubergines and Romano peppers.....things that are rare and quite expensive to buy in the supermarkets.....and I thought some flowers this year too.

Jobs to be getting on with:

- Last chance to prune fruit bushes and trees whilst they are still dormant. Not soft fruit though, their time is in the hot summer weather
- Garlic grows best when exposed to a period of cold weather, so last chance to plant up a few bulbs
- Plant out onion sets/shallots before they start to produce shoots. Reject any that have already started as they will only bolt during the summer.
- Sow celery, celeriac, French beans (they are hardy enough to be planted out before runners) and cauliflower
- March is the right time to establish an asparagus bed. It is going to be there for many years so get the right position. Prepare the bed with plenty of drainage and keep weed free. Lawn cuttings are a good mulch
- Mid March you can plant out your chitted potatoes. If you want some really early spuds you can start some in a black polythene sack in the polytunnel or greenhouse. Punch drainage holes and use multipurpose compost
- Jerusalem Artichokes tubers can be planted now. They are pretty invasive so make sure you dig them all up at harvest time. Any tubers left will grow again, making it a permanent bed
- Tomatoes, peppers, aubergines and cucumbers can be started off on a windowsill or propagator
- Parsnips need to come up now before they start to regrow
- Cover beds with cloches or black plastic to warm up the soil
- Sow early celery, peas, broad beans and spinach
- Some flowering seeds....Larkspur, Antirrhinums, Ammi Majus, Strawflowers, Sunflowers
- Finally my least favourite job.....weeding. Dig out problem weeds especially perennials and hoe regularly to prevent annual weeds.

Roll on the sunshine. Our seed packets are desperate to be opened!
