### FROM THE RECTORY

### **Merry Christmas?**

Dear friends,

I was talking with someone the other day who said they never wished anyone a 'Merry Christmas' (and it wasn't a descendant of Ebenezer Scrooge!). Rather they wished people a 'Happy Christmas' which they preferred, as for them 'merry' was associated with too much alcohol! (and while on this word, let me comment on the carol God rest you merry, gentlemen not God rest you, merry gentlemen, which 500 years ago meant "God keep you strong, gentlemen, let nothing you dismay". It's the same word as Robin Hood and his 'merry' men, who were strong, not drunk).

Sometimes we read in Christmas cards A peaceful Christmas or a Joyful Christmas. It may depend on to whom we are sending the cards!

One thing I prefer is the word Christmas written in full rather than xmas, though xmas is useful shorthand. I associate xmas with the commercial, advertising world, which in our present day is the style and focus for many.

X is actually the first letter of the name Christ in the Greek alphabet in which the gospels and New Testament were written, so it does have a legitimate place. For me it also nicely represents the element of the unknown in this day and age about what happened at Christmas. Increasingly the 'reason for the season' is becoming less well known as the Christmas story itself is less frequently heard. Even those who do know the Bethlehem story are hard pressed to make the connection between the baby born in a stable and the Easter story.

St John bridges those two Christian festivals nicely with his words God so loved the world that he gave his only Son

This verse expresses both the identity of the baby born at Bethlehem and hints at his destiny, with the undercurrent of his being given over to death on the cross. There is a mystery here, which X expresses, both in xmas and also as the shape of the cross.

Thankfully the carol "O come let us adore him" invites us to come and adore him rather than 'come and understand'. While there is an 'X factor' about Jesus the charismatic messiah, teacher and healer, our Christmas services are about worship and thanksgiving rather than analysis and explanation. Come and join in.



### **BECKBURY PARISH COUNCIL**

The Council met on Wednesday 1<sup>st</sup> November 2017.

Councillor Gibbins updated the council in relation to the progress of Beckbury Community Shop. The groundworks for the shop have now been started and are due to be completed by the end of November. The Community Shop has been built and should be erected by the end of November.

From previous updates the Parish Council have purchased a quantity of Smart Water, which is a crime prevention liquid that you use to mark your valuables. Smart water is unique and no two are the same, it is the same as DNA, everyone is different. The liquid when applied to your valuables is invisible to the naked eye and can only be seen under ultra violet light. Every resident of Beckbury will be given a Smart Water kit at no cost to you.

We have arranged a couple of dates for you to collect your Smart Water. The local Crime Prevention Officer, Mick Simpson, will also be in attendance to guide you through the process on how to mark your equipment and how to fill in the paperwork. Members of the Parish Council will also be in attendance to help and support you.

The dates and times are as follows: Friday 8<sup>th</sup> December 1600 – 1900 hrs, Village Hall Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> December 1000 – 1300 hrs, Village Hall

For those who can't make the dates there is no need to worry as members of the Parish Council will make arrangements to ensure that your Smartwater kit is delivered to you.

We currently have an Under 9's Football Team playing out of Beckbury. They play their home games on the Playing Fields behind Beckbury School. It has been raised that parents parking their vehicles on the car park are driving across the football pitch to leave instead to using their reverse gear. This is causing unnecessary damage to the football pitch. We ask that when you leave the car park that you do not drive across the playing fields.

The next Parish Council meeting will be on Wednesday 13<sup>th</sup> December commencing at 7pm.



### Waste Medicines – What the Eye doesn't see

Everybody in Albrighton and district will have visited our local chemists, Rhodes, on the High Street at some time or other. It always seems busy with repeat prescriptions and general purchases. The assistants are helpful even with little time to spare and through the window behind the counter appears a hive of activity, putting together our repeats. I discovered recently that we don't see half of what actually goes on.

As a member of your local Patients' Group I was talking with the Pharmacist, Harry, about changes to prescribing regulations which will double the number of repeat prescriptions to be processed. From Christmas we will only be able to request four weeks at a time instead of the current eight weeks. It is expected that this will reduce waste but I was concerned that it would naturally double the prescription workload. Would the pharmacy cope?

Fortunately, Harry had no qualms about this side of things and welcomed anything that would help reduce the wastage that they see every day. "Come with me" he said!

Not knowing what to expect I followed into unknown territory. If you think the shop is big what followed was an eye opener. Room followed room where medications of all types were being dispensed but at one point access was restricted by a series of yellow plastic tubs the size of large kitchen waste bins two feet high. Not being the most slender person it was a slight squeeze for me. These bins were the reason for my guided tour. They were full of returned unused medication. Prescribed, requested but no longer taken or needed. There are many valid reasons why medicines are no longer required and must be returned for disposal, most obviously following a death, but continuing to request an item when it is not going to be used or taken is not one of them. This appears to constitute the main reason for much of the returned material. A rough estimate puts the value at hundreds of pounds a week, thousands of pounds a year. Recently an NHS England survey of 7600 practices put Albrighton Medical Practice in the top 10% of practices in the country. If all 7600 practices have the same wastage as ourselves, the cost comes to millions of pounds a year.

If you feel you don't need an item or it is not right for you tell the GP or Harry but don't continue to request it on each repeat. The doctors won't strike you off for not taking it, they will be pleased that the change can be discussed.

I was amazed at the volume of material which has to be destroyed. It can't be reissued. Each of us should be aware of the cost of our medication and ensure that nothing is being requested that we know is not going to be used and that we are just going to put it in our own private stock.

The next time I get invited into the back rooms at the pharmacy I hope that I will be able to gain access without a squeeze.
