
Lord God, our refuge and our strength,

FROM THE RECTORY

ARMISTIC DAY 1918

Dear friends

On Sunday 11th November we remember the end of World War 1. But it is not well known that on Armistice Day 1918 more men were killed, wounded or missing than both sides suffered on D-Day in June 1944 during the Normandy Invasion. There were almost 11,000 casualties, including almost 2,700 killed.

The armistice was signed at 5.10am, but the actual ceasefire would not start until 11am to allow the information to travel to the many parts of the Western Front. The news reached capital cities by 5.40am and celebrations began before the soldiers knew about it. Their generals knew but were determined to gain favourable positions, if the cease fire failed, as well as to continue to punish the Germans.

The British attacked, relishing the idea of recapturing Mons, the site of their first battle and first defeat in August 1914. Forty-year-old George Ellison was the last British soldier to die at 9.30am – the same place where the first British soldier died. George was one of the few “old soldiers” who had been shipped across the channel in 1914 and had fought at Mons in September of that year. Against all odds he had survived over four years in the trenches, but was sadly killed 90 minutes before the end of the fighting. Ellison was laid to rest in a small military cemetery near the town. By a strange coincidence, his plot is next to the grave of the very first British soldier

to be killed in the war, 16 year-old Private John Parr.

The Americans took heavy casualties on that last day because their commander, General John Pershing, believed that the Germans had to be severely defeated to ‘teach them a lesson’ and thought the Armistice soft on the Germans. Henry Gunther was the last American soldier to be killed at 10.59am. His unit had been ordered to take a German machine gun post. It is said that the Germans, who knew that they were minutes away from a ceasefire, waved to stop the Americans attacking. But when it became obvious that this had failed, they fired and Gunter was killed.


In the aftermath of the horror and tragedy of the ‘Great War’, Great Britain honoured its soldiers with services and memorials proclaiming their sacrifice as the Glorious Dead. We have heard some of the local stories of those named on our war memorials from our British Legion Apley Branch Chairman Graham Jones

One hundred years on from Armistice Day 1918 our reactions to that War are probably different to those at the time. But nevertheless we still have opportunity to remember and reflect on those stories, and think about our situation today in 2018.

TOUCHED BY DEMENTIA

Sarah Thorpe is the Diocese of Lichfield's Enabler for Northern Shropshire, helping churches to become more dementia-friendly churches at the heart of dementia-friendly communities. Her father, Theo Christophers, was diagnosed with dementia in 2009 and died in March 2018. Five years ago, Sarah started a monthly **Forget-me-not tea** for people affected by dementia in her local church St Andrew's Shifnal.

850,000 people in the UK live with dementia currently – and that number is projected to rise to over a million by 2025. Dementia is a progressive disease of the brain, and it takes us to the heart of what matters – and what does not matter. Sarah's family approach was, *"We learn new dance steps together, as the patterns change"*. Because a diagnosis of dementia is not just for an individual, it's for a whole family.

Dementia is personal, but it is also at the heart of church, taking us to the heart of Christian faith. There's so much letting go with dementia – it's costly, with an on-going sense of bereavement. Sarah writes

With Alzheimer's Disease, you're likely to notice the impact short-term memory – facts, names, dates may all be muddled and in due course lost. But the heart level, the feelings, the love can guide us forwards, *"where there is knowledge, it will pass away...these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love"* (1 Corinthians 13).

In my family, the connections changed enormously over the last ten years of my father's life – but the life and the love remained, to be glimpsed and relished. So my dad, who in his days as a solicitor taught me so much about incisive head-level analysis, latterly taught us all so much in the zany, haphazard journey of the heart that we all shared together. In the words of the poet, Malcolm Guite, from his Stations of the Cross sonnets (Station X, where Jesus is stripped of his garments):

"Now is the time to loosen, cast away/The useless weight of everything but love".

The Parish Council met on Wednesday 3rd October 2018.

The council received an update on the Village Hall. Plans have been formulated to revamp the Village Hall. This has been set into two phases. The Village Hall Committee are busy arranging fundraising events to raise money towards the refit.

The Chairman updated the council in relation to the playing fields. It was agreed that the playing fields are looking the best they ever have been. The Chair also stated that they are also being used by Burton Albion Ladies U'17 football team and Beck Boys U'10 football team for training during the week.

The issues of pot holes were raised. Councillor Gibbins expressed a concern that part of the road at the bottom of Snowdon Road had broken away making it dangerous to all road users. This has been reported to the Council as a matter of urgency.

BECKBURY ALLOTMENTS ASSOCIATION

November on the allotment:

Autumn leaves are falling fast and with all this wind we've been having it is most important to keep on top of them in the garden and on the allotment. Clear paths and lawns for obvious slippery reasons, as they can cause damage to the sward. Collect leaves and keep in a wired frame to make leaf mould and use as a mulch.

Jobs to be getting on with in November

- With no time to rest there is just enough daylight to clear and tidy the allotment of any old crops. Don't just leave the remains of old crops to rot, they will harbour pests and disease. Wait for a clear sunny day and go for it. You'll feel shattered but a lot better for it.
- Sow a crop of your favourite round seeded hardy peas. They can be sown straight into the ground if weather conditions are favourable, or 3 in a pot to transplant later when the roots have reached the bottom of the pot.
- Now is a good time to plant new fruit trees and bushes. Soft fruit bushes can now be moved too.
- Stake Brussel sprouts and sprouting broccoli to prevent them from being blown over.
- Insulate your greenhouse. Horticulture fleece or plastic bubble wrap is excellent. Also your pots to protect the roots of your precious plants.

NEWS FROM RYTON AND GRINDLE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council held a very successful meeting on the 12th September, where several planning matters were discussed including an update on Grindle House Farm. The Parish Council have no objections to the planning permissions at Valley Farm or Wulfrun Lea – full details can be found on the Parish Website www.rytonandgrindle.org.uk.

Cllr Mark Dady confirmed that although some changes at Grindle Farm had begun, the property was still being used by Renew and that he would contact local Unitary Councillor Michael Woods and ask for advice and assistance to bring the enforcement to a close.

In other matters replacement of the old Noticeboards was discussed and it was agreed to replace both the one in Ryton and the one in Grindle ASAP and quotes are being sought, the PC hope to have the new Noticeboards in place by Christmas.

Refresh of the Parish Plan – this is something that Councillors felt strongly about and would like to see the old Parish Plan (outline of what's important to the Parish) updated. Details of this will be added to the Parish Website and will be available for future comment.

Councillors felt that the programme of Grounds Maintenance throughout the summer had gone well and would continue.

All the Councillors felt that better links could be forged with FOSACRAG and the Clerk hopes to develop these over the coming months.

The next Parish Council meeting will be on Wednesday 12th December 2018 – come along and join us if you can.
